# FONDATION TAURUS POUR L'ART Et les sciences

2021-22



Since 2013, the Taurus Foundation promotes Arts and Sciences in Switzerland and beyond. It highlights practices of outstanding artists and scientists.

Every two years, the Taurus Prize for Visual Arts is awarded to a video artist, a photographer, or a contemporary visual artist.

Within the scientific field, the Taurus Foundation supports projects and publications related to paleoanthropology and prehistory.





### Taurus Prize for Visual Arts

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The Taurus Prize for Visual Arts is awarded every 2 years to a contemporary artist by a committee.

Dedicated to a geographical area, the fund aims at upending imposition of a-priori exterior narratives onto territories.

Every 2 years, a new area of research is chosen, the size of a street, a region or a country. The committee is renewed accordingly and composed of people from the area, or having expert knowledge about it. All artists who have a project about this area are invited to apply.

The territory is announced in June, the jury meets in October and the laureate announced in November.

10.000 CHF are awarded to him.her.them by the jury.

The project must be completed within a year. Once completed, it is presented twice: once on the area and a second time in Switzerland, with partnering institutions actively supporting the laureate's work throughout the process.

Through its prizes, the Taurus Foundation supports its laureates over a long time, developping a support system around their projects and fostering collaborations between Swiss and foreign institutions.

# Current Edition 2021-22

While the 2019-20 area of research of the Taurus Prize for Visual Arts was the continental area of Lagos in Nigeria, this new edition is more fluid. The board of the Taurus Foundation chose the Rhone River.

The members of the committee are:

### Mathieu Lelièvre

Matthieu Lelièvre is an art historian and a freelance curator. He graduated from the Ecole du Louvre and the Institut National du Patrimoine in Paris, and subsequently curated and programmed in various public and private institutions. In Paris, he worked at the Musée des Arts Décoratifs; Thaddaeus Ropac gallery; Palais de Tokyo, as well as at the Beaux-Arts Museum in Orleans, France, and in various Berlin galleries. Since 2018, he collaborates with the Musée d'Art Contemporain in Lyon, as Artistic Director and Curator, while maintaining his independent practice. He is working towards various exhibitions, performance programs and workshops in Lyon, France, Brésil, Spain and Tunisia, at present.

### **Mireille Provansal**

As a geomorphologist, Mireille Provansal made her career at the Université Aix-Marseille 1, as part of the European Center for Research on Geosciences and Environmental Studies. She wrote various essays on deltaic milieux, and specializes on the Rhone river delta. For several years, she was an active member of the scientific board of the Rhone-Mediterranean committee, an entity that brings together public and private representatives working around the question of water: public collectivities, the French state, water users, various experts and scientists, and the elected official in charge of the coordination of the Rhone-Mediterranean region.



### **SMITH**

SMITH's practice can be defined as the observation of human identity's mutations. Photography are combined with cinema, video, choreography, performance, bio-art, sculpture, and new media, in an exploration of scientific and philosophic crossings. His works have been presented at the Rencontres d'Arles; Palais de Tokyo; Pompidou Center; Thêatre de la Cité Internationale, in Paris, France; at the Museum of Photography in Helsinki, Finland, as well as in many film festivals and cinemas in Europe.

In 2021, SMITH published two catalogues, Désidération (prologue) with Textuel and Desiderea Nuncia with Palais books, which were released to accompany his exhibition at the Rencontres. SMITH graduated from the Sorbonne University; ENSP Arles (National School of Photography); Fresnoy, and is a PhD candidate at UQAM, Canada.

### **Estelle Sohier**

After completing her PhD at the Paris I University, France, and the Oriental University in Naples, Italy, Estelle Sohier worked in France, Italy and Ethiopia before joining the department of geography and environmental studies of the Geneva University in Switzerland, where she currently acts as Associate Professor. Her research spans the History of Photography, and focuses on the notions of geographical imaginaries. She recently published *Une Odyssée Photographique. Fred Boissonnas et la Méditerranée* at the Editions de la Martinière (2020.)

### 2021-2022 Laureate Emilija Škarnulyte

### For her project Fluvial Extents



### Emilija Škarnulyte

Born in 1987 in Vilnius Lives and works between Norway and Lithuania

Working between documentary and the imaginary, ŠkarnulytĐ makes films and immersive installations exploring deep time and invisible structures, from the cosmic and geologic to the ecological and political. Her blind grandmother gently touches the weathered statue of a Soviet dictator. Neutrino detectors and particular colliders measure the cosmos with otherworldly architecture. Post-human species swim through submarine tunnels above the Arctic Circle and crawl through tectonic fault lines in the Middle Eastern desert. With this new project, Emilija Škarnulyte suggests a journey through the Rhone River via the Geneva Lake (between Switzerland and France), focusing on the delta region and the way the river flow affects the area. The underflow currents carry suspension-laden waters from the river mouth all the way to the deep basin. Anything that is at the bottom is coated in a film of sediment.

By using photogrammetry and underwater lidar remote scanning technology, the artist records with hydrophones and cameras, mapping the bottom of the Rhone river's delta and lake Geneva; observing the effects of erosional and depositional processes; exploring the changing ecosystem and documenting the hidden evidences of human activity before it is covered by thick layers of sediment.

Emilija worked on the project with scientists, discussing with them the conceptual and technological methods used for truth-seeking-voyages and the abstract mythological surplus of poetic language they produce. By exploring and "exploiting" these concepts as a poetic narration, she connects scientific abstraction with daily practice and political, ecological questions.

To develop this project, she specifically worked with LéXPLORE, a floating laboratory on lake Geneva, hoping to reveal the hidden secrets that lie at the bottom of the Lake.

### **INUA ELLAMS**

Born in Nigeria, Ellams is a cross art form practitioner, a poet, playwright & performer, graphic artist and founder of the Midnight Run — an international, night-time, urban, walking experience. He is a Complete Works poet alumni and a designer at White Space Creative Agency. Across his work, Identity, Displacement & Destiny are reoccurring themes. He also mixes the old with the new: traditional african storytelling with contemporary poetry, pencil with pixel, texture with vector images. His poetry is published by Flipped Eye, Akashic, Nine Arches & Oberon.

### **AZU NWAGBOGU**

Nwagbogu is the Founder of (AAF) African Artists' Foundation, a non- profit organisation based in Lagos. In 2019, Nwagbogu acted as the Director of the Zeitz MOCAA in South Africa. He also founded and directs LagosPhoto Festival, an annual international festival of photography. He created Art Base Africa, a virtual space to discover and learn about contemporary African Art and served as a juror for World Press; Greenpeace Photo Award; New York Times Portfolio Review; W. Eugene Smith Award; PhotoEspaña among others.

### **OLUREMI ONABANJO**

Onabanjo is a curator and scholar of photography and the arts of Africa and the African Diaspora. The former Director of Exhibitions and Collections at The Walther Collection Project Space, she has organized exhibitions in Africa, Europe, and North America. Onabanjo was a co-curator of *Recent Histories: Contemporary African Photography and Video Art*, and editor of its accompanying publication (Steidl), which was shortlisted for an ICP Infinity Award in Critical Writing and Research and named "One of the Best Photo Books of 2017" by The New York Times.

### **IHEANYI ONWUEGBUCHA**

heanyi Onwuegbucha is Curator at the Centre for Contemporary Arts, Lagos (CCA, Lagos). He is a 2016 Chevening Scholar with an MA in Art Gallery and Museum Studies from the University of Leeds. His recent exhibition projects include: *LineGuage: Textual Imagery | Linear Allegories* and *A Collection of Stories*, both at CCA, Lagos, a project at the Kadist Foundation, Paris; and *Layers* at Labanque, Bethune, France.

### **TOSIN OSHINOWO**

Tosin Oshinowo is a registered architect in federal republic of Nigeria and also a member of the Royal Institute of the British Architects. She has been lead Architect at cmDesign Atelier (cmD+A) since 2012, the practice which recently completed the Maryland Mall in Lagos. She completed her Architecture Education at the Architecture Association London and also holds a Master's Degree in Urban Design from the Bartlett School of Architecture, University College London. Her interests are in architectural history and socially responsive approaches in architecture design and urbanism. She is one of three curators selected to spearhead the second Lagos Biennial in 2019.

### Anthony Ayodele Obayomi

Born in 1994 in Lagos Lives and works in Lagos

Anthony Ayodele Obayomi holds a B.A. in Creative Arts from the University of Lagos and explores storytelling techniques that combine art and technology in immersive installations and through experimental media. In 2017, he was awarded the LagosPhoto National Geographic Portfolio Review Prize, and was selected for the Electric South New Dimensions Lab in 2018, before winning the Taurus Prize for Visual Arts. Hope, if considered a commodity, sells amazingly well— especially in lesser-privileged parts of Lagos.

Anthony Obayomi witnesses and participates in the daily challenges and creative solutions found by local Lagosians, who try to respond to ordinary life on the mainland. Exploring the dynamic relationship, which exists between two of the most prominent psychological copping mechanisms used by Lagosians, *Give Us this Day* is a photographic project, which will be developed over two years. The title, extracted from a line of The Lords Prayer, is in this context, a literal description of a barely sustainable "hand to mouth" living condition, hardly guaranteeing the present and certainly making no promises for a future.

Lottery games and religious zealotry are common worldly phenomena, and although existing side by side, they are usually separate. On the Lagos mainland however, they present similarities: their organizational structure, social effects and the psychological functions they occupy seem comparable, if not identical. The most prominent and lucrative venture for lotteries and majority religious institutions relies on the merchandising of Hope. Both lottery and religion have been made accessible to everyone, offered as a response to the daily struggles and lack of resources of those inhabitants from the economic capital of Nigeria with the smallest purchasing power.

Premier Lotto, also known as "Baba Ijebu" is the leading lottery and sport betting company in Nigeria. Located on the mainland, it includes over 200 agents supervising 16,000 sales representatives across the country's western region. Simultaneously, and according to Forbes, four of the ten richest pastors in the world with a combined estimated net worth of \$249,000,000 operate or base their headquarters on the area. *Give Us This Day* explores the interlinks between these practices, their overlaps, and the functions they co-perform: to provide—at little cost—a reason to believe that tomorrow may be better than today, even when evidences strikingly point to the contrary.







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
